Each broad theme is divided into sub-themes similar to the ones you have been studying in Key Stage 3. The four skills of listening, reading, speaking and writing which you have been practising in the lower school will be developed further in Years 10 and 11.


"I have worked as a Modern Languages teacher and now work for the Royal Air Force. I am training to be a specialist Weapons System Operator (Linguist).

Information about assessment

The exam board we follow is AQA.

You will sit exams in all four skills of Writing, Reading, Listening and Speaking at the end of Year 11. The exam for each skill is worth 25% of GCSE grade. Speaking* exams will be completed individually by each student.

*Students will have to take part in conversation tasks, photo card as well as role-plays where they have to be able to react to unprepared language tasks.

- Opportunities to travel to Paris for a week residential trip in year 10 where you will experience the city with all its rich history and culture.
- Opportunities for a German exchange where you will spend a week with a German family and learn all about German life.




Where could Geography take you?








Course requirements





Information about assessment

50% Coursework - Producing a portfolio of work and a practical product.

This involves designing, making and evaluating a product of your choice.

The work is done within lesson time and can be used for college or apprenticeship interviews.

50% 2 Hour Exam - A mixture of multiple choice, short answer and extended answer questions.



2021 Results

52.5% of students last year got one or more grades above their target grade

50% of SEN students got above their target grade

41% of students last year got two or more grades above their target grade

10 students got grades between 3-5 levels higher then their GCSE target grades

5 students got 9s 4 students got 8s 1 student got a 7 8 students got 6s

The highest target grade last year was one seven.




Course requirements





BTEC Tech Award in Music Practice Level 1/2

Taught by: Mr D Martin



What we will study:

Component 1: Exploring Music Products and Styles - exploration of the techniques used in the creation of different musical products and investigation of the key features of different musical styles and genres.

Component 2: Music Skills Development - development of two musical disciplines through engagement in practical tasks, while documenting their progress and planning for further Purpose

Component 3: Responding to a Music Brief - developing and presenting music in response to a given music brief

Section C - An essay about live theatre - 32 marks

This is a complex paper where pupils need to effectively describe, analyse and evaluate.

Component 2 - Devising theatre

Creation of a piece of original theatre, based on a stimulus.

A Devising Log about your piece - 3 essays describing, analysing and evaluating the process of devising

Component 3 - Scripted exam

Two performances from the same play in front of an examiner.




